### Online resources for Australian stone artefact researchers - new update

Cutting Edge Archaeology (<http://cearchaeology.com.au/index.html>) provides a range of specialist services to Australian archaeologists and cultural heritage managers, to facilitate research into stone artefact assemblages. One of our objectives has been to gradually build a range of free online tools and resources that will encourage more detailed levels of stone artefact analysis, especially in heritage management contexts. These resources are available on our website [www.cearchaeology.com.au](http://www.cearchaeology.com.au). The website has just been updated and now includes a new resource entitled *A Guide to Stone Artefact Attributes*.

This guide (available from [http://cearchaeology.com.au/news\\_3.html](http://cearchaeology.com.au/news_3.html)) is an attempt to clarify the links between research questions and stone artefact attributes, and therefore simplify the process of research design. The guide lists many of the most common stone artefact attributes that have been studied by researchers, both in Australia and abroad. For each attribute, it provides some basic information about the kind of research questions that have been addressed by studying the attribute - in other words, it provides a rationale for the collection of data on each attribute. It also provides some examples of classification schemes that have been used to study each attribute, and an indication of the types of artefacts that may be suited to such research.

The guide does not purport to provide an exhaustive coverage of this topic, and is no doubt biased by our own preferences. However, like other resources on our website, the intention is for it to be constantly improved and updated through user feedback.

With this update we have also taken the opportunity to add new references to our Bibliography of Australian Stone Artefact Studies. We thank those users of our website who have contacted us with information about publications or theses that we had overlooked. ### **“Business: Profitability and Sustainability of Cultural Heritage” session at WAC 7**

Ian Lilley ([i.lilley@uq.edu.au](mailto:i.lilley@uq.edu.au)) is organising a theme at WAC on “Business: Profitability and Sustainability of Cultural Heritage” with Cornelius Holtorf (Linnaeus University, Sweden) and Marcia Bezerra (Universidade Federal do Pará/CNPq, Brazil).

We would be happy to discuss session proposals under this theme. The deadline for session submissions is **30 August 2012**.

There is another theme that might also be of particular interest to AACAI members, “Economic Development: Community Engagement and Grassroots Movements”, organised by Peter G Gould (University College London), Mike Robinson (Ironbridge Institute, University of Birmingham), and Amanda Forster (Institute for Archaeologists - AACAI’s UK equivalent).

These theme titles are not what any of us originally suggested about these general topics and we had hoped to combine them into one big theme given the

obvious overlaps, but the program managers decided on the above. We will try to make the sessions within the themes fulfil our original objectives. Cornelius and I will be putting up the following session with Luke Godwin (Cultural Heritage Systems and Strategies, Australia):

“Archaeology and business: opportunity or challenge?”

### **ABSTRACT**

This session explores the many opportunities and problems that arise when archaeology meets business within a global economy. In recent years, a number of prominent cases concerning conflicting interests between archaeologists and large corporations have attracted considerable attention and debate. We will discuss the different agendas of archaeology and business, their respective value-systems and the risk and potential of working together, including social, ethical and political challenges. The session was put together out of a conviction that archaeology and business will increasingly find themselves sitting at the same table. Both have more to gain than to lose from exploring their differences and locating areas of mutual interest, thus allowing co-operation and creating sustainable development. The session encourages global perspectives and we invite in particular papers that critically discuss relevant issues and examples in the global South.

## **Call for Nominations – Australian Archaeological Association Awards**

Nominations are called for the following four Australian Archaeological Association Inc. Awards

### **1. RHYS JONES MEDAL FOR OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTION TO AUSTRALIAN ARCHAEOLOGY**

The Rhys Jones Medal is the highest award offered by the Australian Archaeological Association Inc. It was established in honour of Rhys Jones (1941-2001) to mark his enormous contribution to the development and promotion of archaeology in Australia. The Medal is presented annually to an individual who has made an outstanding and sustained contribution to the field. Established in 2002, previous winners include Isabel McBryde (2003), John Mulvaney (2004), Sharon Sullivan (2005), Mike Smith (2006), Jeremy Green (2007), Harry Lourandos (2009), Iain Davidson (2010), and Sue O'Connor (2011).

Nominations should consist of a one page statement outlining the nominee's archaeological career and how this work has benefited Australian archaeology, as well as a full list of the nominee's publications. Note that nominees do not need to be members of the Association; be an Australian citizen; or work exclusively in Australia or on Australian material.

## **2. JOHN MULVANEY BOOK AWARD**

The Award was established in honour of John Mulvaney and his contribution and commitment to Australian archaeology over a lifetime of professional service. It acknowledges the significant contribution of individual or co-authored publications to the archaeology of the continent of Australia, the Pacific, Papua-New Guinea and South-East Asia, either as general knowledge or as specialist publications. Nominations are considered annually for books that cover both academic pursuits and public interest, reflecting the philosophy of John Mulvaney's life work. Established in 2004, previous winners include Val Attenbrow for 'Sydney's Aboriginal Past' (2004), Rodney Harrison for 'Shared Landscapes: Archaeologies of Attachment and the Pastoral Industry in New South Wales' (2006), Mike Morwood & Penny Van Oosterzee for 'The Discovery of the Hobbit: The Scientific Breakthrough that changed the Face of Human History' (2007), Peter Hiscock for 'The Archaeology of Ancient Australia' (2008), Denis Byrne for 'Surface Collection' (2007), Jane Lydone for 'Fantastic Dreaming: The Archaeology of an Aboriginal Mission' (2010) and Annie Ross for 'Indigenous Peoples and the Collaborative Stewardship of Nature' (2011).

Nominations must be for books written by one or more authors, but not for edited books, published in the last three calendar years (i.e. 2008, 2009 or 2010). The nomination must be accompanied by at least two published book reviews. A short citation (no more than one page) on why the book should be considered must also be included.

## **3. THE BRUCE VEITCH AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN INDIGENOUS ENGAGEMENT**

This Award celebrates the important contribution that Bruce Veitch (1957-2005) made to the practice and ethics of archaeology in Australia. In particular, the award honours Bruce's close collaboration with traditional owners on whose country he worked. It is awarded annually to any individual or group who has had long-standing and sustained engagement with Indigenous communities during archaeological or cultural heritage projects which have produced significant outcomes for Indigenous interests. Established in 2005, previous winners include Richard Fullagar (2006), Bruno David (2007), Annie Ross (2008), Luke Godwin (2009), Peter Veth (2010), and Ken Mulvaney (2011). Nominees will have actively engaged with Indigenous communities to produce successful outcomes. The nature of nominations is flexible (e.g. video tape, audio tape, poster etc), considering the wide range of Indigenous collaborations and the remoteness of some communities. Nominators are strongly encouraged to include supporting statements from relevant Indigenous individuals or community organisations.

## **4. LIFE MEMBERSHIP FOR OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTION TO THE AUSTRALIAN ARCHAEOLOGICAL ASSOCIATION INC.**

This award was established to recognise significant and sustained contribution to the objects and purposes of the Australian Archaeological Association Inc.

Previous winners include John Mulvaney, Jack Golson, Betty Meehan (2002), Val Attenbrow (2002), J. Peter White (2003), Luke Kirkwood (2004), Isabel McBryde (2005), Ian Johnson (2006), Colin Pardoe (2007), Sean Ulm (2008) and Annie Ross (2010).

Nominations should consist of a one page statement outlining the nominee's contributions to the Australian Archaeological Association Inc. Note that nominees must be members of the Association.

Volume 1 (Major Issues) and Volume 2 (Other Issues) of the Independent Review's Review Paper have now been released by the Minister for Planning and Infrastructure. The Minister has also released the Government's Green Paper incorporating its initial response to the Review Paper. The Minister now seeks submissions and comments from the community on the Green Paper and the two volumes of the Review Paper.

Alternatively, we encourage members to make individual submissions on the review.
