Conference Theme: The Sociality of Archaeology

The theme "sociality of archaeology" invites you to reflect on the various elements of our discipline that construct archaeology as a cultural and social undertaking in both its theory and practice. This is a wide-ranging theme and we invite delegates to think creatively about issues such as the contemporary politics of archaeology, the place of indigenous perspectives in archaeological interpretation, the role of the public and the media in archaeology (and vice versa), how our theoretical perspectives have changed with our shifting understanding of science, technology and culture, and how our own global positioning within the discipline has affected the culture of archaeology and the archaeology of culture.

Who will attend the AAA Conference?

The conference will attract a broad audience of delegates professionally involved in archaeology and cultural heritage. Participants working in the industry will be drawn from a wide range of areas including archaeology, history, geology, indigenous studies, geomorphology, architecture, museums, mining, local government and planning. The conference will attract delegates from across Australia, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, as well as international delegates.

Vale - Dr Lindsay M Smith

Goodbye Lindsay

On the night of the 7th of June, 2011, our good friend and colleague Lindsay Smith died after a short and one sided conversation with cancer. Lindsay came to archaeology in the latter part of his life, completing a gaggle of award-attracting archaeology qualifications from 1995, culminating in his PhD at the Australian National University (ANU) in 2006. Lindsay joined Navin Officer Heritage Consultants (NOHC) in that year and quickly became a trusted and valued colleague. He worked on both historical and prehistoric sites, with characteristic expertise, rigour and a wry sense of humour. We have missed him greatly since his diagnosis forced his retirement in October last year.

Lindsay's contribution to Australian archaeology is substantial and will be resilient in the face of time. The value of both his MA and PhD research, which revolved around the archaeological record of the Chinese in Australia, was recognised by postgraduate awards by the ANU. In 2008 his PhD thesis was awarded as the best postgraduate thesis for that year by the Australasian Society for Historical Archaeology. Lindsay enjoyed his later role as a Visiting Fellow with the ANU School of Archaeology and Anthropology, and particularly its 'agreeable juxtaposition' with his role as a senior consulting archaeologist. The breadth of Lindsay's archaeology was well exercised and adapted while at NOHC with his conduct of oral history projects, archival recordings and numerous assessments and excavations.

As a believer in mortality and full stops, Lindsay was much taken by the Latin epitaph *Non fui, fui, non sum, non curo,* – 'I was not, I was, I am not, I care not'.

Granted Lindsay, but for those of us still sweating above ground, we will always care, and always miss you.

Text, Illustration, Revival: Ancient drama from late antiquity to 1550

Date: 13-15 July 2011

Place: The University of Melbourne, Melbourne, Australia

In 2011 the University of Melbourne- will host an international conference with the title *Text*, *Illustration*, *Revival*: *Ancient drama from late antiquity to 1550*. Illustrated manuscripts of classical authors often transmitted an insight for much later readers into how ancient illustrators (and thus audiences) visualized these works, but also provided current reinterpretations of the texts. Both tendencies are best exemplified in a cycle of illustrations to the plays of Terence, which provides an almost unbroken continuum from the Carolingian era through to the dawn of the age of printing. But despite the fact that these illustrations represented the action on stage, even down to details of masks and props, there is no evidence at all that the plays were performed in the mediaeval period - they were simply literary texts, to be studied and at the most recited by a lector. Rather, revivals of the Classics on stage began in the Italian Renaissance, and the theoretical knowledge which critics gleaned from writers like Vitruvius were poured back into the illustrated tradition, providing an extraordinary amalgam of ancient and 'modern'. This conference will explore the connections between text, illustration, and revival.
