Cap on Tax Deductions for Work-Related Self-Education Expenses – AuSAE

In the second last week of April 2013, the Federal Government announced it was implementing a \$2000 cap on work-related self-education expenses.

The Australasian Society of Association Executives (AuSAE) is gravely concerned about the significant impact this policy will have on the Australian nonprofit sector.

Why is this a problem?

In the first instance, this policy will severely impact financial viability of nonprofit organisations who provide work related educational programs for a fee. This is just the first of a number of serious flow on effects that will impact all Australians. This policy will:

- Adversely impact the sustainability of Australia's not-for-profit sector
- Increase calls from affected not-profits for financial support from government
- Lead to a decline in overall skill levels of Australian employees
- Adversely affect the young and those just starting in careers
- Adversely affect the competitiveness of Australian workers in the global marketplace

For the above reasons we find the decision to introduce the cap to be retrograde step and we are asking the Federal government to reconsider the implementation of this policy for the sake of the nonprofit sector, young and vulnerable workers, and the Australian economy. What action is AuSAE taking?

- We have sent a letter to the Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer outlining our concerns and requesting a meeting to discuss this further.
- We have issued a media release to Australian media to educate them about this issue.

What you can do?

If your organisation is going to be adversely impacted by this policy we encourage you to take action by:

- 1. Contacting your local Federal MP or Senator to express your concern and ask that this policy be urgently rescinded.
- 2. Email president@ausae.org.au to tell us how this decision will affect your organisation.
- 3. Forward this email to your colleagues so they are aware of what is happening and encourage them to take action.

AuSAE is working hard to have this issue resolved favourably and will keep you up to date with any developments.

Submissions to the Draft Aboriginal Heritage Protection Bill - update

Submissions to the public consultation on the Draft Aboriginal Heritage Protection Bill, which closed on 14 December 2012, are now available.

Submissions have been treated as public documents, in accordance with the information previously provided to submitters. However, personal information (address, phone number etc) has been removed from the submissions made by individuals and two are published anonymously, as requested.

There now are also two reports available related to the public consultation process:

- a community forums report. This report on community view expressed at the seven public forums, was prepared by the consultant who facilitated the information sessions, John Hepper of Inspiring Place Pty Ltd.
- a consultation summary report. This report, prepared by the Department, summarises all feedback received through the public consultation process.

Consider the Carbon footprint of your Membership renewal: Cheques have 'larger carbon footprint' than Direct Debit

With the current obsession of tracking the Carbon Footprint of Everything, consider the impact of your choice of payment when Membership renewals become due in a month or so. It has emerged that Direct Debit payments have been proven to cause less carbon emissions than cheques.

Small business portal Bytestart.co.uk reported of a joint analysis taken out by the Carbon Footprint Limited and Bacs Payment Schemes Limited (Bacs), which found that an ongoing Direct Debit commitment spent 0.76g of CO2 per process.

However, it was calculated that cheques generated 49.28g of CO2 for each time they were used.

Think about this when you find yourself reaching for the cheque book – save your postie and the planet at the same time.
